Handy Advent Wreath: EYFS & KS1



Reflection: we recommend you show an image of an Advent Wreath

Advent wreaths help us to prepare for the birth of Jesus at Christmas. Advent wreaths are round, made of green leaves, and have four candles around the edge. We light one of these candles each Sunday in Advent. By the time we have lit the fourth candle, we'll be just days away from Christmas day, which is Jesus' birthday!

Birthdays are always special, but Jesus is God's Son and that makes his birthday very special. So special that, all around the world, people will be celebrating the day that Jesus was born!

When Jesus grew up, he made sure to tell us that all children and adults are special. God made us all unique and precious. It doesn't matter if we look different or live in different places; Jesus taught us that God the Father loves us all the same, and that we should love one another and work together as brothers and sisters.

Today we are going to work together to make a very special Advent wreath. Our wreath will help each one of us to welcome Jesus at Christmas. That's because rather than leaves, we are going to make a wreath with our own unique hand prints. Our hand prints will remind us of ways we can welcome Jesus and all God's children. Let's think of some ways we use our hands to welcome others and make friends now. *Possible responses: waving to people, shaking hands, playing, holding hands, comforting someone, helping someone up if they have fallen.*

How to make a Handy Advent Wreath – Steps 1 & 2 take place prior to the class activity

1. Taking a large sheet of thick paper and draw a large circle, approximately 40cm diameter. Cut out the shape.
2. In the centre of your cut out shape draw another circle, approximately 20cm diameter. You should be left with a large ring.
3. Provide each pupil with a sheet of thick paper / thin card. Ask pupils to write their names at the top of the page.
4. Invite pupils to make a handprint using green paint. They can either paint the palm side of one hand or press their hand in a shallow tray of green paint, then print onto paper. Alternatively, pupils can draw round their hands and colour in with green paint or crayons.
5. Leave the hands to dry, then cut around the hand shape. Once cut out, write pupils name on the back.



For this activity you will need:

- Sheets of paper or thin card
- Pencils
- Green paint
- Paintbrushes
- Shallow paint tray (optional)
- Scissors
- Glue
- Large sheet or sugar or backing paper (preferably green)
- Print the candle templates on page 3

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How to make a Handy Advent Wreath – instructions continued

- Return hand prints to pupils (this provides another opportunity to discuss how God made each one of us unique and precious). Invite children to come forward and attach their hand prints to the Advent ring using glue. You may need to overlap the prints.
- Once all hand prints have been attached, leave the wreath to dry.
- Once dry, place your *Handy Advent Wreath* in your prayer corner
- Print off the four candle templates on page 3. If possible, print on purple paper (the liturgical colour of Advent), or colour the candles purple. *Traditionally, the candle for the third Sunday of Advent is pink. So if colouring by hand, why not take the opportunity to be liturgically precise!*
- Add one candle to the wreath each Monday following the start of Advent. Liturgically, Advent always begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas day.
